PROJECT OBJECTIVE:

To review the California research evidence on the relative effectiveness of Dill treatment programs, and to present an overview for traffic safety practitioners and policymakers in New Mexico.

SUMMARY:

This paper describes the historical evolution of DUI treatment and sanction programs in California between 1976-1996. Recidivism has declined over this period due in part to the increased use of license suspension combined with DUI educational and alcohol treatment programs.
